In this course, students practice specific reading and writing skills such as interpreting, summarizing, paraphrasing and quoting. Students are also required to master complex reading material and to write frequently in and out of the classroom.

Writing: Students will be able to produce and refine multi-paragraph technical forms of writing and research essays. Students:

- Use all the steps of the writing process effectively and develop techniques to create interesting essays as used in college writing.
- Review of basic grammar, sentence structure, punctuation uses and mechanics will enable students to write grammatically correct paragraphs and essays.
- Have skills necessary to produce well-typed papers on a computer will also be covered.
- Are also encouraged to use the following:
 - 1. A journal
 - 2. A good learners or bilingual dictionary
 - 3. thesaurus
 - 4. a writing portfolio
- Demonstrate an understanding of all forms of plagiarism; correctly use paraphrases, quotations and documentation.
- Use correct techniques for citing and referencing research sources.
- Vary written style and tone according to the purpose and form of specific written assignments.
- Write a well-supported point of view in an argumentative text and in a critical response.
- Use a range of complex structures and vocabulary in concise, well-structured sentences.

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- Refine use of appropriate connectors and transition devices to create coherence and unity.
- Edit for wordiness, clarity, purpose, strength of message, length and audience.
- Identify and revise grammatical and lexical errors, and work willingly and actively to review and peer edit.
